Ron DeSantis' order to honor Rush Limbaugh is unworthy of our flag | Opinion

This was a cut-out of a man who was a racist, sexist and divisive hypocrite, whose stock in trade was riling-up his listeners with hateful, dishonest commentary and claims of fictional conspiracies. Most of all, he was just mean.

Among his litany of absurd ramblings: He claimed the Deep Water Horizon oil spill and the mass murder of 50 worshipers at two mosques in New Zealand were staged by leftists and that

the governor of Virginia let the Charlottesville white supremacist riots in Charlottesville worsen for political advantage.

He compared the deadly Capitol riots to the American Revolution, and fabricated stories about what happened last summer, saying, "They've burned down political federal courthouses, after barricading people inside of them. They've taken over freeways. They've taken over entire cities." "They" being Black Lives Matter.

A recounting of his caustic divisive commentary could go on for pages. And this is the guy the governor wants to lower the flags for.

A man whose purpose in life was to denigrate women, Blacks, Asians, Native Americans, gay people — most anyone whose trashing might get a rise out of his listeners. This was a man who professed to have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. As someone with 12 years of parochial schooling, I find that baffling.

Limbaugh went to his grave denying Joe Biden was president. In the past, following Trump's disparaging comments about Haiti, I wrote about how, if we hope to teach our children well, a president's words matter.

Gov. DeSantis, please remember: A governor's actions speak louder than words.
